They give a small flavour of the life of our wonderful church family and represent the fruits of the effort of all our volunteers and our wonderful staff members.





Christmas saw us open our doors to a number of visitors, both through activities in the Church at the end of November for the Christmas Fair. The screen provided a cosy atmosphere and children's activities were adopted enthusiastically! Ryan worked tirelessly with the choir to arrange two spectacular Christmas offerings and to enable us to go out into our community to sing carols at the Scolt Head. Likewise, our children's Christmas and Easter services saw a good number of children explore the faith through fun, craft, decorated gingerbread and chocolate egg!

These saw a number of new people share in the life of St Peter's. Holy Week itself was a moving celebration of our Lord's Passion and Resurrection as were joined throughout by Fr Nicolas Stebbing culminating in a joyous Easter Vigil as we celebrated the Resurrection of Christ and the triumph of light.

Whilst this year, we said goodbye to Fr Nathan, welcomed Simon Perfect as our ordinand, prepare to say good bye to Robin Griffiths who has been with us on Tuesdays and have been blessed to experience the ministry of a number of ordinands and those training for lay ministry including Evonne training at Mirfield and Anthony training at St Mellitus, we prepare to welcome Mthr Buki to our team who will join Sarah and myself in leading worship and continuing to find new opportunities to draw those around us into our church family and to experience the love of Christ we celebrate in each and every Eucharist!

Social Justice & Cost of Living Response Report

A core part of the way of Christ is serving others with love. We are called to build communities where everyone is welcome and valued; to show hospitality and generosity to our neighbours; to tackle need and unjust structures where we see them; to declare, and show, that everyone is loved for who they are.

In the last year, we have continued to host and support a number of charities that do essential work with people who have faced various forms of hardship and exclusion. These include Happy Baby, Hackney Playbus, and Woven Gold, a choir of refugees and asylum seekers; and various addiction support groups.

In December 2022, the deepening crisis in the cost of living prompted us to establish Warm Wednesday (now called Warm Welcome) (12-5pm) People come and get warm, are fed with a free soup and bread lunch generously donated by Humdingers (a local caterer), save money on their heating and food bills, play games, watch films, and make friends. Each week we welcome around 15-20 guests, of all ages. We have a dedicated team of volunteers, including both attendees of our services and others from the local area. Our steward Debby Lawrence is invaluable as co-leader of this project. From our initial plan to run from December to February, we now plan to continue to run Warm Welcome over the coming months. One of our guests describes Warm Welcome thus:

"A blessing for sure. A warm, safe place where we laugh a lot. There's a genuine interest in people's lives. And plenty of cake! It has become part of my weekly routine and I look forward to coming. The volunteers are great. So many nice people in once place, is a gift at this time. It's a lovely community of people, in the best venue. Thank you!



Alongside this direct response to the cost of living crisis, St Peter's is playing a role in supporting and coordinating wider community responses. Since October 2022, we have organised and hosted monthly meetings of local organisations, charities and schools (chaired by our local councillor Joe Walker), to share information about local responses. This has helped us build closer connections with different groups in the area working to support vulnerable people.

Finally, St Peter's continues to provide an important space where the local community can gather in response to global crises. In March 2023, we hosted a concert with the DBA to raise money for victims of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria. A range of excellent local artists performed. In these ways – as hosts, as community coordinators, and through direct action – St Peter's is inspired by, and makes known, the love of God for everyone.

Finance Report

The pandemic continued to have a major effect on our finances even at the beginning of 2022 but things are now looking more healthy. Total income in 2022 was £183,485 and total expenditure in 2022 was £198,940.

The figures above and below exclude the generous donations for the De Beauvoir Welcomes Refugee projects and related expenditure since this money is held in restricted funds separate from other church finances. In 2022 £17,116 was donated to support the DWR Syria project and, at the end of 2022, a total of £35,266 was in the DWR Syria and DWR Afghan funds.

Our expenditure included approx. £34,000 on building maintenance and the investment of £19,000 in the projector and screen that will help us to expand the use of the church for events and films. In 2022 we contributed only £25,000 to the common fund and this is planned to increase to a more reasonable level over the next five years. We have seen energy price increases like everyone else but new contracts have just been agreed so these unit costs are now fixed for the next three years.]The income was made up of voluntary donations including gifts towards the purchase of the new piano and the screen, and for WarmWeekdays plus gift aid (45%), hire of church and crypt (31%) and investment or other income such as 16 de Beauvoir Road rent, wedding and funeral fees (24%).

As for many charities, it is PCC policy that free reserves of six months' expenditure are prudent and, at the end of 2022, we held marginally more (approx. 7½ months rather than 6 months) reserves than is required by our current policy. This is a good position from which to look forward to 2023 and beyond although not grounds for complacency!

On a personal note, I would like to thank all those who support me in looking after our finances and to say how pleased I am that Jurgita Kucinskiene has joined us as part-time bookkeeper.

Social Life at St Peter's Report

St Peter's continues to be a place of social life, fun & community in De Beauvoir. We're hosting screenings of the King's Coronation and concert. One such event was a concert held to raise funds for the Turkey-Syria earthquake appeal. The event was highly successful, demonstrating the community's generosity and commitment to making a positive impact in the world.

In the year ahead, we're developing an events programme that includes a parent and baby film club, as well as a regular community film club. These events aim to provide entertainment and opportunities for parents and young children to socialise, while also fostering a sense of community.

We're also planning to hold a variety show in the autumn, which will showcase the talents of local performers and help to raise funds for our mission and ministry. This will be the start of a programme of events aimed at helping us increase revenue for St Peter's whilst fostering social connection, supporting important causes, championing local friends and talent, whilst creating a sense of community and fun for all!

Building & Fabric

St Peters is 182 years old, and by and large looking good for its years. But 2022 saw some major update on what might be needed to maintain a beautiful, well preserved, functional and safe building for the next five to ten years.

Over the last two years we have been helped to assess necessary maintenance work by both the Diocesan Quinquennial Inspection (QI) and a Planned Preventive Maintenance schedule (PPM) generously provided by the Benyon Estate through the PCC Building Team.

Key issues from these two reports are listed below, and help us to agree our "To Do" list for 2023. Work to maintain a Roof which, although not about to fall in, requires attention to prevent further deterioration and some practical immediate repair. The Church Boundary walls, gates, pillars and railings all need repair / restoration, after little or no attention for many years. Recent reports re. our compliance with H&S regulations require a more detailed review around how we currently Access and Exit the building. Work to restore the West Front and the porch, where the stonework is damaged and damp has penetrated through old doors providing ineffective barrier to wind and rain.

This is external work only; to this we must add improvements to how we best use both Church and Crypt not only safely but to allow for new developments in the way the space is used. The Diocese are taking a real and practical interest in our plans; we are advised to roll as much as we can into a broader/bigger project for which funds can more easily be sought. With all this in mind, we are thinking to:

Bring forward by 3 years our next Q.I. to 2023, led by a new Architect able to cover both QI essentials and play a leading role in the major project we are beginning to put together. Review all ideas re. improving Access and Exit; e.g. Open up Church door north side to allow exit bridge across to pavement..? Build extension with lift to link Crypt East entrance with Church North door..? Put together a Project Plan by the end of 2023 Accept the Diocese's offer to provide a fund raiser to advise next steps. Consider appointing a Project Manager to steer any agreed Plan to completion. None of this work is yet fully costed as we await the appointment of an architect and fundraiser.
